Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh – Beechview * 1910 Broadway Ave., Pgh, PA 15216

Community: It's a working class neighborhood where some of its people have lived for years. There's a very homey, proud feeling here. At the same time, it's the home of the largest Hispanic population in the city – 13.8% of one of our elementary schools. It's a very diverse neighborhood. There's not a lot for kids to do in the neighborhood. The library serves as a hangout.

Library: It's small and on two floors. It has a big children's room downstairs. The teen area is smaller – along part of one wall and a seating area. The adult fiction area has the most space and it's the first area you see when you come in the library.

Where in the library will the art be housed? It depends on the art – if a sculpture, in the adult fiction area. If a mobile, either there or in the teen room.

Dimensions of display area:

Mobile: Height -2ft Width -4ft Depth -4ft Sculpture: Height -8.5 ft Width -3ft Depth -4ft

What format of art would suit the library best?

Either a mobile or a sculpture, preferably using Papier-mâché

What vision does the Teen Advisory Council have for the artwork?

Bright, welcoming, kinetic, sturdy, and have something to do with aspects of the library. (Computers, books, wii games, friends, etc.) It should be something so different people will want to come back to the library to see it. Any motion should be able to be turned off at night or be caused by the motions of people in the library so as not to set off the motion detectors.

Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh – Carrick * 1811 Brownsville Rd., Pgh, PA 15210

Community: Carrick is a residential neighborhood with a business district along Brownsville Rd. It has two elementary schools and a high school and is very close to both Knoxville and Brentwood. People in Carrick are hard-working and community minded with a strong focus on families.

Library: CLP – Carrick is a small library with a limited number of computers, a reading area near the front windows, a small teen area and a somewhat larger children's area. Carrick teens say their library is "amazing, awesome, close to pizza." (Pizza, of course, is very important!)

Where in the library will the art be housed? In the teen area as part of the teen table.

What are the dimensions of the display area? Height: 2ft Width: 6ft Depth: N/A

What format would best suit the library? Painting or collage

What vision does the Teen Advisory Council have for the artwork? The colors of the sunset, since beautiful sunsets can be seen off of Brownsville Road. We would love to see something interactive – Perhaps a collage covered in glass that teens can add their own art pieces to, or a white board incorporated into the art piece that teens can "graffiti." Ideally we want this displayed in the teen section either on our table top or on one of our book ends.

Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh – Main * 4400 Forbes Ave., Pgh, PA 15213

Community: Oakland is an academic, museum and hospital destination, and also a somewhat centralized meeting point in the East End of the City. Since so many buses pass through here, it is easier for teens to get to this area. While there aren't many teens that live in the area, teens like to visit Oakland for the food, museums, and the library.

Library: The Teen Space at the Main library draws all kinds of different teens, from public and private schools all over the city. There are emo teens, sports teens, teens who hug each other, teens who don't hug each other, music teens, manga teens, fiction book teens, and many, many more kinds of teens at the Main library in Oakland.

Where in the library will the art be housed?

Above the entry to the Teen Stacks.
